In Memory of David Benitez

Sunday night, standing on the knoll with a candle, among friends, I felt a loss for words. I want to redress that omission with some memories.

David Benitez was raised in the tough inner-city barrio life of San Francisco. Of Irish/Mexican descent, his parents remembered Mexico and farm work. Dave knew about prejudice first hand, and he never hesitated to speak his mind for justice. He was tough, very tough, a boxer in his youth, with big knuckled callused hands that instinctively knew how to fight if necessary. But I never saw him use them, he raised himself out of that environment, and in spite of insulting situations Dave kept calm and talked around problems. He loved people and had more real friends than anyone I've ever known - a true measure of his heart.

He was also a hero: Awakened by raging fire from a food booth next door in the King Richard's Faire (Bristol now) Dave, berefoot and semi-dressed, helped push away trailers that were hot enough in places to melt plastic, and he grabbed a wrench, disconnected, and carried away a propane tank that was bolted to the other side of a burning wall, sparks falling all around him.

Dave was enthusiastic raw talent. When he quit working as a stevedore his inclination was art. It had always been so, according to June, who knew him as a teenager. I only saw a few of those early works, but they were fanciful and good, but unappreciated. So he earned a living, bought a home, and raised a family, as a craftsman; he did it at first selling leather handbags, among other items, on the sidewalks of Berkeley's Telegraph Avenue. In my first memory of them in 1972 he was that bushy black-bearded (just a little grey then) guy with the beautiful wife who always had a twinkle in his eyes, and deep crowsfeet creases accentuating his smile. His distinct laughter was recognizable for blocks, and usually there was a gathering of friends near him.

By 1975 Dave had taught himself silversmithing and was experimenting with knives. I had just returned from my first season at this Renaissance Festival and encouraged him to give it a try. He and his brother Steve, and their families, their dogs-Spike, Rico, and Kootie - and several cats, notably "Skippy" the three legged cat, descended on Minnesota in two VW microbuses the following year. (I never imagined what chaos my invitation might cause.)

David collected musical instruments, taught himself to play guitar and sing the blues, always with self depreciating modesty but steadily improving year by year. He'd unleash his incredibly quick wit with off the cuff rhyming lyrics that were both poignant and hilarious.

He was a "stitch," but his serious side passionately wanted the world to be a better place. The word "brother" came easily to him, and if you enjoyed the privilege you were his brother. He meant it. Dave believed in the innate goodness of people, and despite his rough appearance and frequent disregard for bureaucratic rules, Dave was innately good. As good as they come.

Dave's and Steve's first shop in this festival was slapped together without enough money, out of used scraps of pallet wood and straightened used nails (because he ran out of nails late at night) in a frantic three days. That was his style, and nobody could change that about him, not even June. He won the prize for the best new shop that year, and another special award specifically created for him. The words on that award - written by Ken Davenport - may best describe the quintessential Dave. "First prize, for accomplishments beyond his preparation."

I'll miss him forever

CLEANING UP AND CHECKING OUT

It's turning colder, the leaves are starting to fall, the season draws to a close. And here is the last installment of my ramblings about the campground. Cleaning up and checking out.

Cleaning up your campsite. This is fairly simple. It means clean it up! Pick up all the trash, the pop cans, whatever. If you brought in furniture, haul it out, or at least to a dumpster. Fire pits may have to be disassembled. The basic Boy Scout rule applies, "leave your campsite cleaner then you found it."

Those of you who have built platforms may need to disassemble them. The basic rule is that if it will interfere with the place being mowed, the platform must be moved. Also, standing policy is that if you have built a platform, you will get it back again next year, provided you submit a campground application in due time.

By the way, you will find campground application forms in this and the final edition of this year's Privy Councilor. I will be accepting them until October 3, after which you will have to mail them to the front office.

Checking out. When you have cleaned up your campsite, come find me. I will either be in my office, or wandering around the campground somewhere. I will inspect your site, and if I approve, I will give you a \$10 bill at that time. Now understand, you must check out directly with me to get your refund. No refunds are given by mail, and don't come back next year expecting a break if you didn't get a refund this year.

I will be here to check people out up until close of business on October 3. If you don't get out of here before that, you are S-O-L.

This is also probably a good time to point out that anything left in the campground after October 3 will be considered abandoned property, and will be disposed of as we see fit. And those of you with trailers and motorhomes should be aware that MAF will no longer allow them to be stored on Festival property.

If, for some reason, you cannot get your stuff out until

after that date, you will need to make special arrangements with me.

Why am I quitting this job after next year? The glib answer is, "You have to ask?" There are alot of reasons, actually.

I started running the campground in 1988. I have outlasted 3 General Managers, 3 Site Managers, 4 or 5 controllers (I'm not sure of that), 3 heads of CKC, 2 personnel Directors, 1 Owner, and more costume Directors then I can remember.




Also, there are other things I want to do. I am primarily a performer. That's why I got into this business in the first place.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

We hope that serious emergencies don't arise, but if they do, we all need to know what to do. Here are some guidelines to cover situations that arise:

In the event of a life-threatening situation:

- 1. Call 911 from a pay phone. No coin needed.
- 2. Wait at the phone for police to arrive.
- Contact Safety Services. During evenings, BLT & Campground have radios that can contact Safety Services.

If a problem occurs during the show, contact Safety Services. They are the folks in the red and yellow costumes carrying a large pole topped with a flag. They have radio contact with paramedics and police and can also assist you with less serious problems. They are headquartered out of the building attached to the First Aid Station.

In the event that a major disaster occurs, we may need to evacuate the site. You will need to help direct people to the nearest way out. Safety Services will be directing and coordinating crowd control. Please assist them if called.
