



## Craft Department Reminders

<u>Craft Awards</u>: Outstanding work and contributions of Festival craft participants will be recognized at the participant party this Saturday night. The awards themselves have been purchased directly from the craft shops at the Festival. Be there with your applause and Huzzahs—you may be a winner! The Craft Awards program will begin at 8:05 PM at the Pavillion.

Thxes: An unavoidable fact of life. Don Brown of the MN Department of Revenue will be in the Cate B area on Sunday, September 28, from 1 to 4 PM. He will expect to see you if you're an out-of-state resident or a Minnesotan with questions.

License Fee: Deposits on 98 craft license fees or prepayment of the entire fee will be taken at Gate B on Saturday and Sunday. Deana will be on hand to issue receipts and answer questions from 8:30 AM to 4 PM both days. Deposits are due by October 10 and may be made by mail or at the office after the show closes. However, the office will be closed on Friday, October 3.

Mesters Ballots: Masters are reminded that their critiques and ballots are due by September 30th. You may give them to your monitor, leave them with the Mistress of the Hall, or mail them to the office.

<u>Shop Clean-up</u>. Food, paper and most other kinds of refuse and leftovers draw varmints. Clean in and around your shop before locking up. Items left outside the building are subject to disposal by the Festival. Proper disposal of unwanted materials is your responsibility. There may be a few unhappy animals, but the staff will appreciate your help.


Many people are concerned or at the least unclear as to what Ole Pam will be doing in the future. Be unconcerned and let me make this clear.


