The Dog And That...Guy! By Carr

This past weekend I put on my Rat Catcher and hit the streets to abuse young and old alike. I love to improvise in the midst of laughter, or to hear a little outrage. There was a time when I was one of the only performers given latitude to be bawdy. I used to feel I hadn't done my job if "management" hadn't received a letter or two about something offensive that I inflicted upon some unsuspecting soul. Now days, I have competition, probably too much of it, and my bag humping and callous remarks seem a tad old fashioned and out of vogue.

Still, I love the connection I feel when the audience and I can co-create a comedic dance ripe with possibilities. As a street performing character, I can't do what I do alone. It's simple, without the audience, I don't have much material to work with. Stage musicians, euro-clowns, jugglers, magicians and sword fighting fancies love to have an audience, but could play their lines to an empty theater. There is a linearity to what they do, a beginning, a middle and, hopefully an end. In the form of performing I occupy, it's random, analogue, and doesn't really have any kind of theatrical arc, story line, or even a set of jokes. Most of the material is found by provoking the audience, pushing them around verbally to see what happens, and we don't know where it's going to go! When they respond, as they always do, the play begins. As a performer, I have to "jump and build" from one idea to the next, from one audience idea to another. The show is over, more or less, when I walk away.

Over the years I've come to value two particular elements, among many, that make working in this godforsaken dust hole worth the effort. Oddly, the first one isn't even human, it's the dogs. Dogs are a gold mine of comedic possibilities, because they seem to be good with whatever comes along, no matter what the conditions. We've all seen the kind of people that drag around some poor old-gimp elderly dog that would rather be home sleeping, farting and licking its integumentary system, then to be walking around in the cancer inducing cloud of limestone dust, spilt beer and hippie DNA covering the festival grounds. Still, even that poor dog is ready to go if provoked. Dogs are born ready to bark, chew, play, eat, drink, sniff, piss, poop and hump on anyone willing to get on the ground and give the invitation. Give a dog a bone, and anything can happen.

The other one, and even more critical to personal performing inspiration, is that guy or gal that will laugh at everything. They rarely get involved in the show, though they are comedies voyeurs, standing in the shadows and working up a lathering laugh track. What gives them their identity is the amount of loud, unselfconscious laughter they bring, which is a fuel spigot that can set an entire audience on fire. When they are watching and laughing, our material is funnier, our timing better, and our ideas more abundant. I've worked in the pitch with audiences who are flaccid and frigid, but if I've got just one dude with the big laugh, or a lady with a gasping, wet cigarette chortle. I know all will be well.

These are the little things we streeters know and love, so, if you want to make our day, send your friends that like to laugh over to watch our show, and if they have a dog, have them bring it along, because at the end of the show that dog, that guy and I will have had the time of our lives.

Lost and Found

We have been getting a lot of questions about lost and found items. If you lose something during the day, check the information booth. Even if it's turned in at B-Gate, we will bring it up to the information booth. After cannon, items are delivered to B-Gate. The same goes if you find an item. On Monday, all items from the weekend are taken to the main office. There they sit until someone claims them. Just as a reminder, items are NOT brought back to B-Gate from previous weekends. Helpful tip: Use the words "mom, dad, or home" in your cell phone. That's usually where we start when trying to get it back to its owner.
