The Joy Of Change Commentary by Carr Hagerman

As I've aged and moved beyond the flexible stupidity of my youth, I've come to see my life not in limited terms of the fun of momentary hedonism, rather, at what exists that sustains, what is here and remains regardless of the various paroxysms of daily life.

Like most everyone, I got caught in the economic downturn with a business vulnerable to economic constriction. I went from making a multiple six figure income to something closer to room temperature. I had a beautiful home in the country that sat on nearly 15 acres of stunning land, a garage that could easily hold 6 cars. I traveled around the world in first class, stayed at some of the nicest hotels in the world, and worked with some of the biggest companies on the planet. I worked hard, I played hard, and I enjoyed the fruits of my labors.

In 2008, my fortunes changed and my wife and I were forced to take a deep loss on our dream home we'd worked so hard to attain. My client base shrunk, and I found myself having to sell, give or toss away many of our things. Near the end of this rough transition I also found out I was a Type I diabetic, and the rest of my life would be populated with needles, blood and carb counting. It was the crowing moment in the destruction of my life, or so I believed...change destroyed everything. At the height of my travel years I recalled sitting next to a British woman in First Class on a flight to Frankfurt, Germany. We had beautiful and roomy seats, first class food or whatever else we wanted in booze and other upscale options. At one point early in the flight I commented that it was nice to fly first class. She responded by saving "Well, that is true, but being in First Class also means we are never home, we're always traveling away from our families and missing the things we love to do." It struck me, that as I was on that flight, sitting in my big seat, my mother was in failing health and that every flight, every gig, every job that took me away meant a loss of a conversation, a missed and irreplaceable chance to hold her hand or simply to watch the television with her for a couple of hours. Success came with great cost,

As I look at my life now, I can't be more grateful for the transitions and the challenges I've been through. Though I'm doing well, I don't make the kind of money I used to, but I also don't have a lifestyle to support, I don't travel as much, and I get to be home. Change brought about new patterns, new ways of thinking, and a sense of joy has replaced the nights of anxiety and worry. Even my diabetes has taught me about the preciousness of life, about being patient and letting go of the unnecessary. But more important than all of this, is the discovery of adventure, the necessity to tinker. When we are met with destruction or monumental change, even modest changes, we discover we have an amazing capacity to recreate our lives, to build something new and even more exciting. We can see change as an invitation to push out, to tinker with new realities, to experiment and build new patterns and behaviors. Without the provocation of change we can become complacent and atrophied and our creativity can wither on the vine of predictability. Why not see our lives as a kind of laboratory, a place to test out new ways of doing things, new jobs, new languages or to learn a new dance step? Even the research on aging is conclusive, that trying out new ways of doing things keeps us agile longer, keeps the fading memory stronger longer, and gives our optimism a viral boost.

(Here at the festival, we're committed to trying a few new things, changing old patterns, and scraping off the crust and dust of the "always has been" way of doing business. The parade, as an example, is now at 6:30, with a new parade for crafters at 11:30 AM. These two parades may usher in new traditions, new ideas and new energy, who knows, lets see!)

Whether it's my life, getting old, or the changes that are happening here, what helps to make change work and yield rewards isn't that we throw everything away, but what we choose to keep and love that is already here. Change isn't easy, sometimes we get rolled over, and sometimes that changes we try fail. More often than not, it seems to me, is what we find when all of the change and all of the shaking has stopped. We are bound to those whom we love and who love us that are still here. In the midst of change we find new comfort in the simple sound of sunrise, the rush of the wind, the rain on the roof, and the laugher of friends. These are the things that sustain and remain even when the rivers swell and bring change to our doorsteps.

New Large Grassy Area behind the campground

4 Shuttles in the morning

2 shuttles during the day

4 shuttles at night

There will be 3 shuttle stops in the parking lot

Buses will run to C-gate. They will also stop at B-gate and First Aid if requested.

The Parking lot will be lighted at night and have Privies in them.

General Information:

There is an opportunity to walk, but we prefer that everyone takes a shuttle for your own safety.

Everyone must put their parking pass in their windshield on the driver's side.

Participant parking will be located in the designated parking area.

Everyone with Green and Red parking passes will be affected.

A limited amount of special passes will be given to people with medical conditions or special circumstances (distributed by your Department Head).

It is important that you follow directional signs at all times,

Participants not following the rules will have their vehicle towed at their expense.

How this will work:

Participants will be required to enter the grounds through Hwy 41.

Hwy 41 will be a Participant Entrance only.

Participant badges will be checked at the entrance of Hwy 41.

There will be a parking attendant and a security guard at the entrance of the designated parking area who will be checking your parking pass and provide directions as needed.

Those participants with Green On-site driving passes will be allowed to drop off whatever they need to on site, but then will be directed to the designated parking area.

For those of you who are parked in the designated parking area, there will be shuttle buses that run to C-gate,

Shuttle busses will run from 6:45AM -10:00PM on Saturday

Shuttle busses will run from 7:00AM-10:00PM on all of the other days that we are open.

Participants must park in the designated parking area and cannot park in the main lot or in the specialized parking lot without prior approval.

Please remember that we will tow your vehicle.

Please be nice and friendly with the Parking attendants and the Security Staff. They did not make these rules-they are just facilitating and enforcing these necessary rules.
