The Smell Of The Make-Up

Finally. It's the last weekend and in just a few days I will have my weekends back. I won't have to be up before my dog on weekend mornings, I won't have dust caked in my nose at the end of the day, nor have to spend one more minute seated on the plastic privy throne. It'll be nice to get back to my routine, back to the predictable patterns of my ordinary life. I sometimes have to wonder why I even work here any longer. So many of the people that inspired me to come back here are gone now. Penn and Teller left decades ago, my old partner Crist quit 15 years ago, King George is retired, Lee Walker deceased, and Avner an old man who lives on an island out east. These were my friends from the past, the gang I hung out and traveled with, they've moved away and moved on and yet, I'm still here closing this place down for another year and wondering what is wrong with me, why do I keep coming back?

So much of my life has been built on the work I've done here. From my speaking and writing, consulting and creative work, everything I learned I learned in the trenches of this place. I came here as a kid all of 14 years of age without a hair on my chest, and without any sense of what this place would mean to my life. I was part of the Tree Top Theater Players, a high school theater group that performed story theater, where actors would recite various parts of a story while playing a part in the play. Mary Miller directed. It was fun, but with only a few shows a day I had a lot of time explore the margins of the festival, and to watch other performers.

It didn't take me very long to become hooked on some of these other performers. Acts like Avner and Penn and Teller became my primary focus between my Tree Top shows. I would go to nearly every performance and watch them work. Even after I created the Rat Catcher persona, I would catch multiple shows and always help them pass the hat at the end of their shows, never taking a dime in return. On most occasions Penn and Teller insisted that I share in some of their hat money, which I declined, after one show Penn said "If we ever become famous, you'll never have to pay to see our show, ever." Now, when I'm in Vegas, I can stay at Penn's house, hang with him, and I've never-paid for any of their shows...ever. Once I started wearing my Rat Catcher stuff, everything kind of fell into place. I was a focus of frequent newspaper articles and TV spots. I started to notice fans, whole families that sought me out and followed me around. I suddenly had a kind of strange status, a weird popularity that took me years to understand. People watched me work because there was a sense of surprise to it, a level of unpredictability that made for comic tension. Whatever it was, I'd found a stage and audience and was all in for the next 37 years.

As I look back at the road behind me, to those moments in my life where I could and perhaps should have jumped off the festival stage, I realized I stayed here not so much because I didn't have other options, I did, but that every other option seemed like flatland. While other places offered more money, a regular check, benefits, stability and flush toilets, these festivals offered creative anarchy, and open stage with an open audience and a deep well of inspiration. Instead of leaving, I chose to pay attention to the work here, to unravel it a bit and see what is inside, and to uncover the mechanics at work in this rare style of performing.

The end result is a life full of extraordinary. I've been able to work with some of the world's biggest and brightest brands and some of the smartest people on the planet. My work has taken me to audiences around the world, and in every single presentation I've done there are pictures of this place, stories of performing here, and the remarkable, self-organizing and creative loving community that is here. I've done leadership consulting with the likes of Apple Computer, Hilton Hotels, Paramount Studios and Home Depot to name a few. In each of these, the protagonist was this place.

I write this not as a way of congratulating myself on my own work, or to brag but to explain why the compass home brings me back here. Yes, there is something about friends and this being like a summer camp and it's it fun! But there is something deeper here, and I nearly forgot what it was. It has something to do with freedom and tinkering, engaging an audience in a kind of open frontier that invites the creative impulses and gives weight and measure to exploration, self realization and insight.

When I forget the gift that is always waiting for me in the exchange with the audience that is the moment I become burned out and disinterested. When I tune my creative dials back into the audience, to the channels of possibilities, I'm stunned, awakened, happy and alive. I don't come back here because I always want to, I come back here because I feel I need to. It reawakens me and reminds me of the importance of creative vitality.

I don't know what will happen next year, perhaps I'll hang it up and enjoy a fall free from festivat, but I doubt it. It is true now that I have the benefit of the years behind me, that there is something to the old saying I he smell of the make up, the rear of the crowd"...and if history repeats itself, those of us who have tapped into the veir or creative gold that have sinside us, inside this place, will return to welcome in yet another year of surprise and delight...and if I listen, I can hear the crowds rearing now.
