BARKING





In the service of Isabella

ROME, JANUARY 6, 1502

The Priest and I blended into the wedding party that had come from Ferrara to excort Donna Lucretia Borgia from Rome, and from her Father, the Pope, to her new home. I set off in search of my acting troupe which had been dispatched to entertain the great party of guests.

In Ferrara waited Duke Alphonso d'Este, brother of Isabella and Lucretia's future husband. The information that we risked our lives for and that had cost the life of the Vatican guard was now on its way by measuring to Ferrara. The intelligence consisted of the value, quantity and tryle of Donna Borgia's wedding trouseau. For the Este family must not be outshone by the Borgia clan. But do not be misted, dear reader, Donna Isabella is not a vain woman, she is a diplomat. In today's political clime Donna Isabella's fashion is nearly as important as Don Alphonso's cannon. At the wedding were sure to be ambassadors from the mad king of Germany, Emperor Maximilian it; and those from the court of tox XII of France, from the King of Spain and of all the noble families of Italy. While being a dwarf had stopped my father from becoming a general commanding battalloes, it would not stop me, Valentino Giovanni, from directing a band of actors.

We had started out two years ago by touring through the villages of Ferrar and Manhua presenting the usual fare of slap-slick commedia so loved by all the classes of Italy. With my diminutive height accentuating the absurdity, I usually played II Capitano, the braggars soldier just returned from war. Those two years were happy and carefree. I refined my skills at acting and when I had free time, I began to translate the comic works of the ancient writer, Plasutus. While my monies had outfitted the troupe at the beginning of our tenure, we began to turn ragged after two years of touring. While playing to the plebes was gay and easy, if provided as with only food and drink. If we were to live in rich style then we must surely have a member of a noble house as our patron. I planned to travel and work our way to the house of Este and using the influence of my father's position as court jester as our key, boped to perform and audition for the Este family. The littes are well known as lovers of the classic works of the ancients and I felt secure that our performing the works of Plastats would secure us the position with the court.

It was the end of May and we set up our stage in a small village several leagues to the south of Ferrara. We had begun to present Plautus' lines in the usual scener; in this way to judge their effect on the audience. For dear reader, the heart of a piebe is as open as the sky. It is an Italian heart and unschooled in the subtleties of the court. I felt, and still feet, that if the plebe is astonished and delighted with the action and script that is presented to him then so will be his master. Indeed, the master will be fascinated by the ancient script and while his mind is thus diverted his heart will be open to the comedy. Although it is a subversive and excommunicable opinion, I believe that the heart of a nobleman and his piebe are the same and only an accident of birth and subsequent learning separate them.

But to return to our story, we had opened an improvised scene in which the young lovers had just confessed their affections for each other only to be interrupted by myself as II Capitano. I had entered and was awaggering about the stage spouting Plaunts text in place of the usual speech and was very pleased with the audience's response. I carried with me a two handed sword that was nearly half again long as I am tail. This I would brandsh with great gusto much to the amusement of all. In the audience were servants of the Gonzaga family. They shouted and called to us and the sudience to disrupt our performance. However, after our years of touring we were little afraid of drunken comments, indeed we used the same to our advantage and for the pleasure of the vicewers. So we continued our performance until one of the younger men of the Gonzaga house jumped onto the stage. We are used to this in our line of work, but I must confess that I became enraged when he grabbed Julia, who was playing the young lover. It may have been mere jeak-cuty that this tail man was paving Julia or it may have been fear that this beast would have her and our child that she carried. But I turned the broadsword and using the flast of the blade I dealt him such a blow that he dropped to his knees. Town again he flat of the blade cut towards me. Suddenly the audience stooped its laughter. It was not only the action on the stage that had quieted them, but they noticed a noble viewer of our comedy making his way through the crowd. Riding forth on his great steed, Don Alphonso & Este called out, "The first to draw blood shall see his own by nightfall. I order you to lower your arms." Then he rode up to the stage and eyeing me with wonder exclaimed, "Are you not Valentino Giovanni, the son of our court fool?" I replied that I indeed was. "Then I command you and your company of actors to appear in my court two days hence. To be sure that you do not fall to harm from the servants of Gonzaga, I leave you half my body guard to accompany you to the the castle." Making a motion with his hand he turned and rode off with his retinue.
