



# SPACE RESERVATION FOR 1989

Space reservations for 1989 must be received by Festival no later than September 30. Reservations must be accompanied by a 550.00 deposit per shop space. (If you have two shops spaces, \$100.00 deposit is required, etc.) Deposits may be applied to your 1989 shop space fees.

Space reservations and deposits will be taken at Gate B Participant Booth on September 17, 18, 24 and 25.

### **ADVANCE PAYMENT OF 1989 FEES**

This year the Festival will offer a 5% discount for 1989 Peddler, Service or shop space fees paid in full by September 30, 1988. The shop space fee will be raised \$3.00 per front foot to \$33.00 per frontage foot. Prepayment of an average 15' shop space would result in a savings of \$24.75. All prepayments will be taken at Gate B participant booth on September 17, 18, 24 and 25.

# INSURANCE MEETING

Last Saturday night Brian Huseby and a representative of the Festival insurance company presented an informational meeting on the different types of insurance that are relevant to shop and cart owners at the Festival. The Festival has been working to try to develop a policy to meet the needs of people involved in shows such as the Festival. The insurance industry has not shown much interest in this special type of need, and many agents are not knowledgeable in this area. Stories of unreasonably high costs have been heard, and of inadequate coverage. The Festival is concerned about adequate coverage and cost, especially as it may impact the viability of some specialty artisans. In an effort to meet the need, the Festival is working with the agent who in turn is working with the underwriters for various insurance companies. At present such insurance is not mandatory. #### MASTERS' MEETING

On Sunday evening of Labor Day weekend the Master Artisans of the Realm held their annual meeting. It was the concensus of all who attended that the Masters Program is a vital and important part of the Craft Program at the Minnesota Renaissance Festival.

A resolution was made that the terminology used when referring to people who create arts and crafts at the Festival be artisan. It was the feeling of the group that the term crafters implied a level of competence below that of the craft participants at the Minnesota Renaissance Festival. The merits of several other terms were discussed. It was felt that the term "Artisan" recognizes the high level of skill of the Festival craft participants and is gender neutral. The help of all Festival people is requested in making this change in our everyday speech.

The merits of the current methods of evaluation and administration of the Masters Program were also discussed at great length. Some changes in this area of the Program will be made during the off season and Implemented at the 1989 Festival. Any comments on this subject are welcome and should be directed in writing to Linne Jensen.
