## **MAIL & PACKAGES**

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

Each shop must have a fully charged 5 lb. ABC Underwriter approved fire extinguisher easily accessible at all times. Lost extinguishers or those not in working order must be replaced within 24 hours of notification by Brian Myers of Safety Services. Fire extinguishers must be checked and tagged every year. The tag must be current during show. This service will be available during the second weekend of the show, August 19-20, 7:30 a.m.-12:00 p.m., for a nominal fee. Gary Chaplin of Metropolitan Fire Equipment will be at C-Gate early on the day stated above to refill, tag and replace fire extinguishers. ## IMPORTANT NOTICES

MEDIEVAL EUROPE was not a collection of nations as we know them today; rather, it was made up of many small kingdoms, fieldoms or baronies.

Each principality had its own ruler who employed skilled fighting men, called knights, for protection. Because of their armor and their huge war horses, as few as five knights could patrol and protect their leader's land and people. These knights were, in reality, the first policemen.

As roads developed and travel increased, the knights dimished as an effective weapon. With the invention of armorplercing weapons such as the long bow and musket, the age of knights and chivalry perished.



#### SITE HOURS ON SHOW DAYS

- 6. Gates to get into site close: 8:30 a.m. and 8:30 p.m. on show days.
- REMINDER: All persons in vehicles will be checked for I.D.'s at Hwy. 41 and Chestnut Gate in the evening during show days. All persons without I.D.'s will have to leave the vehicle until proper identification is presented.
- Gate guards will be on site to check for I.D.'s until 7:30 p.m. on Show Days. C-Gate will have a guard until 7:45 p.m. each show day.

#### Master of the Week

Ron Landis is an engraver specializing in coin making. He and his wife live most of the year in Magnolia, Texas, He participates in the Minnesota and Southern California Renaissance Festivals and a few other coin shows.

A Master coin maker and engraver at the Minnesota Renaissance Pestival. Ron Landls is now focusing on mechanical aspects of coin making: researching, building and maintaining authentic 16th Century coin making equipment.

After the Minnesota Renaissance Pestival is over he will begin work on restoration of the Royal Mint of Spain in Segovia. Slated to be completed for the Columbian Quintennial in 1992, the Mint will be equipped like the original 16th Century one and will be capable of producing metals and coins. In addition, the Mint will establish an apprenticeship program in coin making and engraving to try to restore the art form.


## Minstrels, from whence did them come

Minstrels were groups of wandering poet musicians who flourished in Europe during the Middle Ages. Known by various names in different countries, the earliest English minstrels were called scoops.

Minstrels were often held in high regard, and were amply rewarded by noblemen in whose castles they performed. In fact, many minstrels were accepted members of noble households. Others travelled about giving performances at castles along the way, or stopping at village markets and fairs to perform their songs and skits.

Minstrels often made up their own songs and stories as they entertained, rarely following a set program. They also repeated popular ballads and folk tales of the time, and are credited with helping to preserve them. These accomplished musicians performed their songs of chivalry and courtly love with great skill.

Although the earliest minstrels were musicians, the profession later became so generalized that all manner of jugglers, acrobats, storytellers, dancers, and slight-of-hand performers were known as minstrels.

Early physicians counted one's pulse in the interval it took to recite the Lord's Prayer...


Now, placing a quarter and one's finger in a small electronic box, seen in many a modern restaurant and bar, can give a digital readout in the time it takes to say "Amen".

## Bandana Square


We will be centering around our Mid-East people. Belly dancers, peasants and all will converge upon Bandana and entertain over the lunch hour.

- The Grande Parade truly looked grand.


## A Few Notes

Eleven years ago proceeds from operating the Archery and Darts booth provided a group of adoptive parents the seed money they needed to start an adoption agency. Since 1978, HOPE International Family Services has brought more than 600 children, from the U.S. as well as other countries, into loving families.

Good, sound social work practice, combined with a philosophy that views clients as responsible adults are the beliefs behind the agency's emphasis on less traditional, "parent-initiated" adoption. The agency works with potential adoptive parents living within 150 miles of its Stillwater, Minnesota office. In western Wisconsin, HOPE assists birthparents wanting to plan adoption for their child.
