DECORATION, REMODELING AND CONSTRUCTION

As the end of the season is here, you may be thinking ahead about changes you would like to make in your space for next year. Both Mid-America Festivals and Scott County have requirements concerning building modifications. Some of the most common questions about the requirements and the process are:

O) Who should I talk to first?

A) Contact your department head with your ideas. Food participants contact Bonnie Jacobson, craft participants contact Linne Jensen, entertainment participants contact Gary Parker.

O) What type of information is needed?

A) The information required depends upon the scope and complexity of the project. A written plan including a concept sketch and notes about your ideas is all it takes to begin the process. You will be notified of additional drawings that may be needed.

Q) Who approves the project?

A) Projects which present no structural issues may be approved by Bonnie, Linne, or Gary. Projects which have structural involvement must be approved by Brian Huseby, Director of Operations, and the necessary permits must be obtained.

Q) How do I know if a building permit is required?

A) A building permit is required if any structural elements are included in your project.

O) Who applies for the building permit?

A) Mid-America Festivals acts as a coordinator between building owners and Scott County to help both parties to work together smoothly and efficiently. Arnie Erp, Site Manager, or Brian Huseby, Director of Operations, submits the drawings you have provided to the Scott County Building Inspector and applies for the permit.

Q) When can I begin work; and how long does this process take?

A) No work, including demolition, can begin until all necessary approvals and permits have been received. Design approvals can usually be received in three to four weeks. Building code reviews and permit applications can usually be processed in two to three weeks. A good rule of thumb would be to submit your concept sketches about two months before you plan to begin work on the project.

As you're thinking about new projects, it would be a good idea to take measurements of your space now while you are here. You may find actual measurements useful in your concept sketches and in determining the feasibility of your ideas.

INSURANCE

Insurance is required by the Festival for craft and food participants. Recently, there have been a number of questions about insurance from the craft area. We hope that the following will clarify the situation.

Q) Why have insurance?

A) In today's society, insurance is a necessity for any business. In the case of general liability or product liability insurance, the purpose is to protect and defend the business from potential lawsuits. In the case of property insurance, the purpose it to protect the business against property loss. Workman's Compensation insurance is required by Minnesota state law for all businesses that have employees, and is intended to protect the business from employee claims due to on-the-job injuries.

Q) What type of insurance is required for the Festival?

A) For craft participants, a certificate of insurance will be required for 1991 that indicates the craft licensee carries a current Comprehensive General Liability insurance policy with minimum limits of liability of \$1,000,000 listing MAF and CKC as additional insureds. Please consult your license agreement for specifics. Food participants are also required to provide certificates of insurance.

Q) Why is the Festival requiring general liability insurance? A) With the large number of people who attend the Festival, it is probable that some mishaps will occur. For example, a patron might be injured by stepping through a weak floor board or a sign might fall and injure a patron. Both the participant who holds the license to do business in a certain space and the Festival are liable and vulnerable to lawsuits in such cases, so it is important that both responsible parties carry the necessary insurance.

Q) Why \$1,000,000 limit?

- A) The courts today have been awarding very high amounts to individuals who have been injured. Given that our society seems to be more and more willing to engage in lawsuits, it seems prudent to provide coverage that anticipates a high settlement in the case of a

Your I.D. Card must be turned in with your costume. Please pin your I.D. Card to your costume and put your costume in a bag with your name on the outside of the bag. (Pins & bags will be available at the Costume Shop.) You may return your costume dirty on your last day of work, after that it should be returned clean or you will be charged a \$3.00 laundry fee. Costumes and I.D.'s may also be mailed in. Costumes and I.D. Cards must be checked in within 1 week from the close of the Festival. After October 9th, there will be a late return fee of \$5.00. If you lose your I.D. Card, there will be a fee of \$5.00. Final paychecks will be held until your costume and I.D. are returned, and all paperwork in your file is complete.



- A) You can contact any insurance agent. The Festival has found that Bill Velin of Professional Insurance Agency of the Twin Cities to be understanding of our people's varied situations and needs, but the Festival does not endorse any particular insurance agents or company.
- Q) How much does general liability insurance cost?
- A) The cost of the insurance depends on the specifics of your situation and the type of insurance package you require. General liability may be rated as a part of a total business package, or may be purchased separately.
- Q) What about other types of insurance?
- A) As a matter of good business practice, you should be certain that your business is protected by insurance as is appropriate to your business. The Festival expects that you will be responsible for the determination of your insurance needs in areas other than general liability, and that you will maintain the needed so the Festival will not be at risk. No proof of insurance other than general liability insurance will be required unless it is specifically stated as an added condition of your Agreement.


