CRAFTS

MARCO POLO - A CONDENSED HISTORY

In the thirteenth century, Venice, Italy, was one of the most advanced states in Europe and was a famous trade conter. The brothers, Nicolo and Maffeo Polo, were successful and adventurous merchants of Venice, trading throughout the Middle East where they could buy Chinese and Indian goods from the Arabs.

Marco, Nicolo's son, was born in Venice in 1254 and began traveling with his father and uncle as a youth. On travels in the Modele East in search of a new trade route to Russia, the Polos met the Mongol army and were invited to the court of the Kubba Khan, the fourth descendent of Ghengis Khan. The Great Khan's court was in Cambaluc, the present day site of Peking, China. The Polos reached the court in 1274 after a journey lasting three and a half years.

Marco Polo remained at the Great Khan's court, learning the Mongol customs and language. In the Great Khan's service, Marco Polo went on many exploratory missions throughout the Orient, and kept extensive dairies.

After returning to Venice, Marco Polo was captured in a trade war between Venice and Genoa in 1298. In prison in Genoa, Marco Polo told the story of his travels to fellow prisoner Rustichello of Pisa, a scribe and romantic writer. The stories were preserved in a book which was copied, translated into many languages, and became a well-known favorite.

The stories were widely disbelieved and may have been romanticized by Rustichello or various translators. Nonetheless, Marco Poloserved as an inspiration to many European explorers, among them Christopher Columbus, who owned a well-used and heavily notated copy of "The Travels of Marco Polo."

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

VISITING MASTER MARK VAN STONE

August 24-25 (second weekend), Mark Van Stone of Portland, Oregon, will visit the Festival with the cooperation of Katie Beery and Kris MacDonald of the Hall of Scribes, Shop #1205, and Festival veteran Scott Cleland.

Mark Van Stone is a noted historian specializing in the Medieval and Renaissance time periods, especially decoration and ornamentation. After completing a degree in Physics from Occidental College, Van Stone was awarded a fellowship to study Celtic Art in Ireland and has been committed to Medieval and Renaissance studies ever since. Respected among scholars, Van Stone is also well known for his calligraphy and celtic knotwork decorative pieces. Earning his living as a free-lance graphic designer and teacher, Van Stone has taught throughout North America, Europe, New Zealand, Australia, and Japan. He also leads study tours and hosts a monthly television programa

The Hall of Masters will serve as host for Mark Van Stone and Scott Cleland. All craftspeople are invited to exhibit work in the Hall to create a special exhibit in all media. Work incorporating historical motifs, mythological cretures, or other ornamentation used during the Medieval or Renaissance may be dropped off at the Hall on Saturday morning, August 24, between 7:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m.

THE BRITISH CROWN JEWELS IN REPLICA

The 1991 Minnesota Renaissance Festival is the very proud host to the most faithful replicas of the British Crown Jewels ever produced. This 40 piece replica set took a team of jewelers over two years to complete. Each piece of the collection is shown in full size and is blueprinted to the exact specifications of the original.

Every year, more than one million people from around the world flock to London, England to behold the awe inspiring beauty of the British Crown Jewels at the Tower of London. They are without a doubt the most spectacular collection of jewels ever on display anywhere in the world. They are cherished for their historic and religious significance. Their intrinsic value, although incalculable, is relatively unimportant. To the British nation, the Crown Jewels are priceless. So valuable and history laden are these jewels, the Queen herself is not permitted to take them out of the country.

These jswels so closely resemble the originals that in August of 1987, a British couple were held for twelve hours at the German-Belgian border on suspicion of stealing the "real" British Crown Jewels. Despite their protest, they were unable to convince customs officials that their entire collection were replicas. The replica collection was headed for an exhibition in Bonn, Germany to celebrate its forty years as a twin city with Oxford.

The British Crown Jewel exhibit contains some of the most celebrated artifacts in the world including The Imperial State Crown, which the Monarch wears after Coronation and again at the Opening of Parliament each year. The Imperial State Crown is the world's most priceless item of jewelry. It is the resting place of the famous "Black Prince's Ruby" and the "Second Star of Africa Diamond" (317 carats) cut from the "Cullinan Diamond" which is the largest diamond ever mined. The remainder of this spectacular crown is glorified with 2,800 diamonds, sapphires, rubies, and pearls.

The exhibit also contains "The Sceptre With The Cross" which is held in the right hand of the Sovereign during the crowning. The Sceptre contains the world's largest cut diamond, "The First Star of Africa" which weighs a full 530 carats. This stunning pear shaped jewel was also cut from the "Cullinan Diamond" which was found in South Africa in 1905 and weighed 3,106 carats.

Observe the ceremonial changing of the guards, who will be on guard to protect the majestic jewels. The entire 40 piece exhibit was made possible, in part, by the Minnesota State Lottery, and can be seen in Folkestone Hall.



INTRODUCING THE KING'S LOT

Lotteries and games of chance have been capturing the hearts and minds of mankind since the beginning of time. The practice of drawing lots dates back to ancient times. In fact, the first lottery with cash prizes dates back to 1490, two years before Columbus discovered America.

"King's Lot" tickets can be purchased at each Minnesota Renaissance Festival wine booth. Should you strike a lucky ticket, stand up and shout, "Huzzahl, good fortune cometh my way!!!"


